SECTION II - PROJECT DESCRIPTION

4) Please describe the purpose and intent of the grant.

The San Fernando Valley Arts & Cultural Center (SFVACC) is a \$501(c)(3) organisation offering exhibitions of visual and performing arts at its gallery located at 18312 Oxnard Street in Tarzana, CA. All of the art exhibitions and most of the other events are open to the public free of charge. In April 2017 the SFVACC will present a multi-faceted cultural exhibition designed to remove the "barriers of unknowing" that often stand between cultures. The goal of FIRST PEOPLES is to enhance the understanding and appreciation of the myriad indigenous cultures of North America and Mexico by showcasing the works of native artists living in Southern California. More than 100 diverse works of art will be on display in FIRST PEOPLES. This presentation exclusively features sample artworks by participating native artists. The exhibition is described fully in the attachment to this application. The grant will be used to fund direct costs of the exhibition including materials for preparation of a mural (\$950), costs of installing the exhibition (\$750), a promotional banner (\$325) and a portion of the advertising and promotion of the exhibition (\$470).

5) How will this grant be used to primarily support or serve a public purpose and benefit the public at-large. (Grants cannot be used as rewards or prizes for individuals)

As noted above, the SFVACC is a §501(c)(3) organisation offering exhibitions of visual and performing arts. All of the art exhibitions and most of the other events are open to the public free of charge. The "First Peoples" exhibition will be a tremendous educational and cultural resource to the Tarzana community. The exhibition will include labeling explaining the cultural significance of each artwork, artists' statements of purpose, a mural collaboratively painted by exhibiting artists, workshops and educational outreach to local schools. 


What does it mean to be a native artist?






What is the San Fernando Valley Arts & Cultural Center?
